CMM College of Theology strives to pioneer transformational theological ministry training with revelatory study in a hybrid classroom setting. The School of Theology aims to teach fundamental truths of the faith with the revelation that prepares students to disciple the world in Spirit and Truth.

DISTINCTIVE

1. **Study the Word of God:** We encourage students to engage with Holy Spirit as they study, which develops intimacy in knowledge and understanding.

We see students transformed in *their hearts* as they write what Holy Spirit speaks to them through their studies.

2. **Honor those who have gone before us, pointing to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit** the Body of Christ has significant teaching and information available. Many well-known and little-known scholars, mothers, and fathers who have gone before us have laid down their lives and dug wells of revelation that we are still drinking from today.

We encourage students to analyze and synthesize the information with Holy Spirit against the Word of God so that graduates are not afraid to face hard questions, schools of thought, or ideas outside their comfort zone. We believe that critical thinking with Holy Spirit is crucial in these times.

We then encourage students to dig their wells of revelation, finding their voice in a safe environment, to help them find their contribution to the Kingdom that was set before the foundations of the world. (Eph 2:10)

3. **Friendship Learning/Discussions:** Our students' study and prepare for class. They invest and then share during class discussions. This style of learning is a classical Hebrew type of learning called Chavrusa, also spelled chavruta or hehavruta (Aramaic: חֲבֵרֻתָא, lit. "friendship" or "companionship").

Chavrusa-style learning puts each student in the position to analyze the text, organize thoughts into logical arguments, explain, reason, hear the other students, question and sharpen each other's ideas, often arriving at entirely new insights into the meaning of the text.¹ Our trained instructors facilitate discussions with Holy Spirit to encourage students to clarify their thought process.

We see students transformed by *wisdom* as they hear others and grow from the experience.

4. **Discovering your path to a fruitful, victorious life:** Many students come to our school hungry to seek out their purpose, to 'walk out their salvation, and live in the fullness, that the Bible says is ours. Students discover the path the Lord designed for them, they find their voice and gain confidence in following the Lord to expand kingdom through practical application in real time.

We see students transformed by *counsel* as they allow the fullness of the process to lead them to the destiny of good works prepared for ahead of time. (Eph. 2:10). Our professors share our desire to ignite a deep hunger for the Lord in a rare and transformative way, not found in any school globally. Our staff has earned the trust and respect of hundreds of our students, and many develop lifetime relationships with our team.

STATEMENT OF BELIEFS

The following is a statement of our position of basic Christian doctrines. As once stated by a great missionary, "There are certain basic Christian truths about which there must be agreement. On all other doctrines, there should be liberty. In all things, there must be charity." We resolve to take an uncompromising stand on the essential doctrines of the faith and extend "the right hand of fellowship" to all who hold to them. It is also our resolution to protect the liberty of Christians to hold different perspectives on the "non-essential" doctrines.

There are doctrines we may consider non-essential, but which are essential. We, therefore, make known our belief on these, while presenting them with tolerance toward those who may hold a different position. We are committed to truth and accuracy in doctrine, but also understand that one can hold right doctrines and still do damage to the body of Christ by causing divisions over the non-essentials. We are, therefore, just as committed to the essential Christian character, believing that "In all things, there must be charity." As the apostle stated, "The goal of our instruction is love, from a pure heart and a sincere faith" (1 Timothy 1:5). That, too, is our goal and commitment as we promote the following teachings that we hold as truth:

On the Person of Jesus

There is only one true God, who is revealed in three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Jesus Christ is the Word (Logos) of God. The Word was with God in the beginning, which states His pre-existence as one with God. "By Him, all things were created, both in the heavens and on earth" (Colossians 1:16), therefore making Jesus the Creator. Jesus Christ is the Purpose of God found in all of creation. He is the Father's delight and desire, and the Father is looking for the reflection of His Son in all created things. Jesus is the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End. In the beginning, it was the ultimate purpose of God for all things to be summed up in Christ (Ephesians 1:10).

Jesus Christ, who pre-existed with God in the form of God, emptied Himself to become fully a man that He might be the propitiatory sacrifice for the sins of mankind. Through His propitiatory sacrifice made on the cross, all who believe in Him and His sacrifice have their sins remitted and are restored to the fellowship with God lost by man's transgression.

Jesus was born of a virgin, by the seed of the Holy Spirit. His virgin birth is a testimony that only the Spirit can beget that which is Spirit. Those of the new creation are not solely of human origin but are born from above by the Holy Spirit. The resurrection of Jesus' physical body after His crucifixion was literal, as will be the resurrection of both the just and the unjust on the Day of Judgment.

"There is one God, and one mediator also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (1 Timothy 2:5). All who seek restoration and fellowship with God must go through Jesus and cannot approach God through any person, spirit, or doctrine. It is also a supreme presumption for any person or institution to seek to be a mediator for others in place of Christ Jesus Himself.

The apostolic commission was for His followers to labor until Christ was formed in His church, to present every person complete in Christ, and to manifest the sweet aroma of the knowledge of Him in every place. When Jesus is lifted up, He will draw all people to Himself. We consider it the primary purpose of the church to esteem and exalt Jesus in every way. It is the focus and devotion of CM Missions to know and preach Him, and not ourselves. We pray for the grace to continually respond to His call to return to our first Love, that we might passionately devote ourselves to pleasing Him in all things while preparing for His return.

Our Program Basis

We have abbreviated our requirements for graduate and postgraduate degrees in an effort to hold the tuition to a minimum and allow busy ministers and working students every opportunity for higher Spirit-filled, prophetic, Christian education. It is the desire CMM College of Theology to mix the Word with the Spirit out of a deep well of the rich prophetic heritage that CMM offers. Each year is a complete package for the degree.

Curriculum and Reference Material

The CMM College of Theology seeks to offer the highest quality curriculum and reference materials. Resources are subject to change at the discretion of our faculty leaders. Not all subjects are taught every year.

Student and Faculty Nondiscrimination Policy

The CMM College of Theology admits students of all races, color national and ethnic origin with all rights, privileges, programs, and activates made available to students of CMM College of Theology. CMM College of Theology does not discriminate based on race, color, national, or ethical origin in administration of its policies, loan policies, or other school-administered programs.

Statement Standards-Code of Conduct

All students are required to give a testimony of having accepted Jesus Christ as their personal Savior and Lord. Each student is expected to conduct himself/herself in a manner that will, at no time, bring reproach upon our Savior or CMM.

Accreditation

If the sole purpose of needing an education is for the Gospel ministry or related field within Christian ministry, secular accreditation is not necessary or required. All Christian churches accept quality Christian education regardless of which accreditation group, if any of the referenced institutions belong. If study is for purpose other than ministry, such as business administrator, engineer, lawyer etc., Students should apply to an institution that belongs to a regional accrediting association. In secular education, regional accreditation is essential! For education of those in Christian service, secular accreditation does little more than typically make the tuition beyond the reach of most ministers.

CMM College of Theology provides associate, bachelor, master, and doctor degrees. We have been able to secure full accreditation through private ministry accreditation to keep tuition cost at a minimum.

South Carolina Exemption Status

We hold an exempt status with the state of South Carolina as our degrees are ministry degrees and not a liberal art.

The South Carolina Commission on Higher Education is the licensing authority for private postsecondary education under the provisions of the Nonpublic Postsecondary Institution License Act, Chapter 58 of Title 59, South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976, as amended. Section 59-58-30 of the law states that the definition

of a “nonpublic educational institution” does not include “(4) Institutions whose sole purpose is religious or theological training.”

Definition of credit hour

CMM meets the necessary standard requirement regarding the number of classroom hours or the equivalent per earned credit hour. We maintain 15 classroom hours to equal one semester hour through reverse classroom experience. Students will work outside of class and then attend online discussions.

Requirements for Admission

- Students must be 18 years of age or older and profess Christ as Lord.

To consider your application for admission, the following is to be understood and submitted

- Students must have a high school diploma or equivalent.
- All materials must be in English.
- Submit your official application for admission online to info@cmmtheology.org
- You must be proficient in the English language and have a minimum TOEFL score of 70 on the internet-based test, or 523 on the paper-based test.

Honorary Degree

Honorary degrees are only awarded by CMM College of Theology through rare and exceptional service and work in the Kingdom of God. The body of work and life of the person are considered in such matters. This being said, is a consideration of the current and past work and writings, not future life choices or changes that may occur.

Potential students may submit requests to the President and Dean. However, we reserves the right to accept or deny the request. We have refused far more than we have approved. CMM College of Theology is not generous with this particular degree as only a few have earned it. The majority of our doctoral degrees are students that complete the full program. This is a very honorable degree and should be treated as such.

Transferred Credits

CMM College of Theology reserves the right to allow credits earned at other institutions for similar courses taken at that institution. If credit is awarded, the candidate will be assessed \$2.00 per credit hour. These hours may not exceed 60% of the required hours for graduation from CMM College of Theology.

Graduation

To graduate, students will have completed the academic, attendance, and financial requirements for the year with excellence and godly character. Those who complete the first year with high distinction will be granted automatic admission into the next year. **High distinction:** *Completes all assignments with a 3.5 or higher; Paid tuition in full within the due dates; attends 90% of class and upholds the values of CMM.*

Grading Criteria

CMM assigns credits to each course. The core subjects are graded on an 8-point grading system. A grade of 70% is considered the minimum passing grade. Other CMM assessments and requirements will be given a pass/no-pass grade. All grades will contribute to an overall GPA.

A = 3.6 - 4.0 Superior
B = 3.2 - 3.59 Excellent
C = 2.18 - 3.19 Average
Below C Incomplete

Submission of Assessment

Completed assessments are to be submitted on the due date via the "Classroom" interface.

Due Dates

Each assessment has a Due Date. These are spread over the academic year to allow for a manageable course load. Completed assessments must be submitted by the due dates. Late submissions will lose a grade of 10% for each day the assessment is late. Students must gain competency in all failed assessments and subjects to be granted eligibility for graduation. The ability to resubmit a failed assessment or repeat a failed subject will be at the discretion of the instructor.

Extensions

A student may apply for an extension to the submission date of an assessment. The request for extension must be submitted to the instructor no less than two days before the due date and must demonstrate exceptional circumstances (for example, significant trauma, extended sickness, death in the family, NOT poor time management, computer malfunction, and the like). Approval is based on the discretion of the instructor.

Application Fees and Tuition

A non-refundable application fee of \$60 is included in your downpayment all applications. Upon approval of the application, 20% is due at REGISTRATION. The remaining balance of tuition and other applicable fees MUST be paid in full by April 15th of each school year. A 10% discount on the annual tuition is applicable if all fees are paid in advance and no later than Oct 1.

Refund Policy

Students may change or drop a program at any time during the first week after notification of their acceptance into CMM College of Theology. When a program is dropped or withdrawn from and no substitute is taken, a 10% refund will be made upon request. No refunds are given for workbooks. Students must notify CMM College of Theology in writing, of the intention to withdraw or drop a program, with no refunds on doctoral degrees.

STUDENT GRIEVANCES

Informal Resolution

"If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church." We use the Biblical method of resolution according to Matthew 18:15-17

The student is strongly encouraged to discuss his or her grievance with the person alleged to have caused the problem. This discussion should be held as soon as the student first becomes aware of the act or condition that is the basis of the grievance. Additionally, or in the alternative, the student may wish to present his or her grievance in writing to the person alleged to have caused the grievance. In either case, the person alleged to have caused the grievance must respond to the student promptly, either orally or in writing.

Escalation of Grievance

If the student is not satisfied with the response, he or she may present the grievance in writing to the director of the department. Any such written grievance must be received by the Administrator not later than forty-five calendar days after the student first became aware of the facts which gave rise to the grievance. (If the grievance is against the director of a department, the student should address his or her grievance to the next level of authority. At this level, a fact-finding investigating should take place. Based upon the report of the information found, the Administrator shall make a determination and submit his or her decision in writing to the student and to the person alleged to have caused the grievance within ten calendar days of receipt of the report. The written determination shall include the reasons for the decision, shall indicate remedial action to be taken if any, and shall inform the student of rights to seek review by the Director.

Appeal Procedures

Within ten calendar days of receipt of the administrator's decision, a student who is not satisfied with the response of the administrator after the escalation may seek further review by submitting the written grievance, together with the administrator's written decision, to the Director.

Financial Information

Fees and Tuition

The Associate and Bachelor's degrees are 3 terms each or 18 months long, each course is 60 credits. \$500 is required to start class. You can begin these degrees the summer before live classes in the fall of the year and pay over 18 months. The Master's degrees are 30 credits each. \$500 is required to start class. Students can pay over 12 months. Doctor of Ministry students must pay \$800 to start, and the CPhD will pay \$900 to start with the remaining balance over the time it takes you to complete your program. Students taking over 3 years to complete one of these degrees (either DMin or CPhD) will be required to pay an additional \$500 for the 4th year.

Transcripts: \$30 is due for each transcript upon request. Transcripts will be mailed directly to the requesting institution.

BACHELOR DEGREE

A bachelor degree takes a total of 3 years to obtain.

The bachelor candidate must complete an associate degree first or provide the equivalent.

Associates/Bachelors of Ministry in Biblical Studies

Our goal is to take knowledge and couple it with spiritual growth to equip all students, to be able to live and express Biblical truth effectively the contemporary world. CMM College of Theology courses are optimal for growth and maturity. The live discussion and written work is transformative. We value the student's participation.

It takes three full years to earn a bachelor degree. The first year is an Associate of Ministry in Biblical Studies and the second is a Bachelor of Ministry in Biblical Studies. The full bachelor's degree is 120 credit hours. This is a ministry degree, not a liberal degree. Below is the breakdown of credits.

 - **30 credits** for practicum (*eligibility below*) (15 for Associate and 15 for Bachelor year practicum)

PRACTICUM EXPLAINED

Two Year Requirements and Assumptions

BREAKDOWN BY YEAR: ASSOCIATES YEAR CREDITS EXPLAINED

30 credits may be awarded for practicum of ministry experience. We have a detailed manual for the student and school that track the ministry work or mission trip experience that you are doing or have done to receive these credits. CMM College of Theology provides the manual for the practicum.

30 credit hours of practicum (1 credit = 15 actual hours of supervised activity or work or mission trips). **450 actual** hours of experience or 6 months part-time ministry or 12 weeks full-time ministry. This can be split between the associate and bachelor year.

BACHELOR YEAR CREDITS EXPLAINED

If a student enters at the Associate level, to graduate, they would need to complete the class year with a 2.50, out of a 4.00 which gives them 30 credits. They would also need to complete 15 practicum credit hours (**225 actual hours** of ministry or mission trips) and 15 Supernatural Identity Module credit hours.

If a student comes to CMM College of Theology with an Associate degree or the equivalent, desiring to enter the Bachelor year, 15 credits for practicum and 15 credits for Supernatural Identity are assumed. In other words, we are assuming 60 credits have been satisfied before they enter the bachelor year.

Students then entering at the Bachelor level wishing to graduate, would need to complete the class year with a 2.50 out of a 4.00, which gives them 30 credits. They would also need to complete 15 practicum credit hours (**225 actual hours** of ministry or mission trips) and 15 Supernatural Foundation credit hours.

For the Bachelor student only, 15 credit hours are assigned for the Bachelor level in **Supernatural Foundations**. An 8 credit hours are assigned with "Firm Foundations" by Bob Weiner, and 7 credit hours are assigned electives in Supernatural Financial Responsibility.

Our goal is to take knowledge and couple it with spiritual growth to equip all students to be able to live and express Biblical truth effectively in the contemporary world.

The Bachelor of Ministry in Biblical Studies provides students with an appreciation of the history, context, and the message of the Bible. The prerequisite for the Bachelor degree is an Associate degree. Therefore, it takes two years to complete the Bachelor degree. This program prepares and equips the student with a firm foundation in principle and text.

ASSOCIATE of MINISTRY in BIBLICAL STUDIES

The Associate of Ministry in Biblical Studies is a 3-term degree.

ABS 103 GOD'S LOVE PT 2

Course Description

This study continues to study the Love of God in a revelatory way through the epistles of John.

3 CR AMIN 104 LIFE OF CHRIST & YOU

ABS 104 LIFE OF CHRIST

Course Description

This study of the life of Christ as seen through *the gospels*, what happened in history and how it

applies to us as individuals, the Church and humanity.

4CR AMIN 105 APOSTOLIC HISTORY

ABS 105 APOSTOLIC HISTORY

Course Description

This study includes the supernatural works of the early church in the book of Acts and their application today.

10 CR AMIN 106-111 EARLY CHURCH HISTORY *Through the Lens of Paul*

AMIN 106 PERSECUTION PT 1: *Ministry of the Church*

Course Description

Students dive deep into Paul's Epistles in historical context of 1 and 2 Thessalonians to understand the richness of the message. Persecution is a current theme in our time. Yet foreign to the Western mind. In this class, we study how to "excel still more" during persecution for the faith. I and II Thessalonians has much to teach us. CMM is a mission-based school with deep roots in covert nations. We bring first-hand experience into the classroom as we study Paul's encouragement to stand firm in Christ.

AMIN 107 CONFLICTS, RESOLUTIONS AND MINISTRY

Course Description

This is a historical study of Paul's letters to the Corinthians during 55-56 A.D. We look at the conflicts, resolutions and gain insight and the application today.

AMIN 108 THE LAW vs GRACE-WHAT WE BELIEVE PT 2

Course Description

this study of the church in Galatia, we will look at the history and what it means to be free in Christ and not under the law of Moses

AMIN 110 PERSECUTION PT 2: *Identity In Christ*

Course Description

In this study, we look at the joy of suffering as Christ and identity in Christ. Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon are excellent sources for this study. It is our prayer that this class will open doors of revelation for new pathways of understanding.

AMIN 111 LIFE IN CHRIST: Discipleship

Course Description

This study will look at discipleship, the cost, and the blessings of the "laid down life" for Christ through the books of I and II Timothy and Titus.

3 CR ABS 112-114 FAITH AND TRUTH IN HARDSHIP

AMIN 112 FAITH PT 1: Truth in Hardship

Course Description

Students will dig into I and II Peter and Jude to find the importance of Truth, even in hardship, growing in faith, and standing on promises. It is our hope and belief that this becomes a lifestyle.

AMIN 113 FAITH PT 2: *Faith in Action*

Course Description

This is a study of faith in action. This is not faith for salvation. We will see that faith flows out of the love relationship with the Lord especially through the book of James.

AMIN 109 WHAT WE BELIEVE PT 3

Course Description

How do we live a life worthy of Christ? Here we study Paul's instructions given to the church at Ephesus on grace, peace, and salvation.

1 CR AMIN 114 OLD TESTAMENT LITERATURE MODULE PART 1: WISDOM/KETUVIM

AMIN 114 OT LITERATURE PT 1

Course Description

This is a study and survey of the book of Proverbs, historical, and daily application for transformation.

5 CR AMIN 115 LITERATURE REVIEW PT 1 & FINAL PAPER

AMIN 115 LITERATURE REVIEW Part 1 and FINAL PAPER

Course Description

A literature review is an integral part of writing. Whether books or thesis, we need to gather our sources and understand what God is saying through it. This is a beginner level, and the student will write a 3,000-4,000-word formal paper on the life of Paul.

15CR AMIN 116 SUPERNATURAL IDENTITY MODULE

Course Description

Students may start at the beginning of the Associates or complete it the summer after with the study questions and journal weekly. Students can work through the books when time permits, summer break can also be a time to go through books. This course will culminate in an 1000-1500-word essay paper.

15CR AMIN 117 PRACTICUM MODULE

Course Description

Students may start at the beginning of the Associates or complete it the summer after as time permits. Credits will be awarded for practicum of ministry experience, see page 18 for detail.

BACHELOR OF MINISTRY in BIBLICAL STUDIES

The Bachelor of Ministry in Biblical Studies is a 3-term degree.

The CMM Theology Bachelor of Ministry in Biblical Studies builds on the Associate of Ministry in Biblical Studies and is a foundational course of God's revealed *and* supernatural Word. Strong foundations are essential at every level of our journey, regardless of our calling and destiny.

Whether you are just starting as a believer, in the ministry field, working in the secular world, busy as a homemaker, or are a seasoned veteran of the faith, the CMM Theology Bachelor of Ministry can help you grow in intimacy as the ground is laid for the supernatural truth in the Word of God.

The need for ministry professionals is growing in every mountain or sphere of influence. With a Bachelor's degree in Ministry from CMM Theology, you can prepare to meet the spiritual needs of your community in ministry, business, education, etc., in impactful ways.

BBS 201-205 GENESIS, EXODUS, LEVITICUS, NUMBERS AND DEUTERONOMY (Jesus in the Pentateuch)

Course Description

This course will cover each book with supplemental reading and study including ANE. A paper will be required for each book along with study questions.

2 CR BMIN 206 CHRISTIANITY BASICS

BMIN 206 WHAT WE BELIEVE PT 4

Course Description

This study will compare and contrast the old and new covenant along with the foundational doctrine of the Christian faith through the book

of Romans. This is a foundation for further study in the master class. We will also study what modern scholars say.

12 CR BMIN 207 -209 ESCHATOLOGY BASICS

2 CR BMIN 207 ESCHATOLOGY PT 1

Course Description

We begin our study by looking at the historical placement of Daniel and his contribution to eschatology and part 1 of the book of Revelation.

3 CR BMIN 208 ESCHATOLOGY PT 2

Course Description

This is a study of the book of Revelation in the historical placement, relationship to Jesus, and how it pertains to end-time events. We look and listen to other scholars and different points of view to better understand the discussion in the church.

3 CR BMIN 209 COMMUNICATION BASICS:

Finding Your Voice and Using it

Course Description

Students learn to communicate what they hear from God as they research with Holy Spirit and then present from a place of confident peace in Christ, this helps the student grow to communicate God's love and revelation.

4 CR BMIN 210 FINAL PROJECT

Course Description

Students pick their topic as it pertains to current events, the Book of Revelation, combining all that and develop a formal paper.

This block can be completed in the summer before or after class starts. We need Supernatural Foundations in our lives no matter how old we are in the natural or spiritual.

4 CR 211-212 HISTORICAL BOOKS/PROPHETS**2 CR 211 FAITH PT 3: JOURNEY OF ISRAEL****Course Description**

This is a historical and spiritual study of the journey of Israel; it's heroes, and the loving God who led through Joshua and continues to lead us today.

2 CR BMIN 212 FAITH PT 4: *Faith in the Face of Moral Decline***Course Description**

This historical and spiritual study of God's mighty and often supernatural deliverance during a time of Israel's cyclic falling away and return. Judges and Ruth provide great inspiration for the believer.

Supernatural prayers will make all the difference. Are we agreeing with God or are we asking God to agree with us?

15CR BMIN 116 PRACTICUM**Course Description**

Students may start at the beginning of the bachelor year or complete it the summer after as time permits. Credits will be awarded for practicum of ministry experience, see page 18 for detail.

GRADUATE DEGREES

CMM Theology offers a graduate, courses that build upon each other. Students can stop at the Master of Ministry degree or build to the Master of Divinity degree and beyond.

MASTER of MINISTRY in BIBLICAL STUDIES

As a believer everything is ministry. Church is ministry. Business is ministry. Being a housewife and mother is ministry. The church walls cannot contain what God is doing. This class will compare and contrast the OT prophets with current prophets. We look at how the OT Prophets interacted with the kings of their day and the application it has in our current world.

Students have the opportunity to better understand prophecy and God's blueprints which leads us to the **capstone or final project**. This program prepares and equips the student with critical thinking and personal revelation for the ministry and ministry of life through intentional study. Students will choose to do one of the following for your final project:

1. Learn about and serve in existing ministry: Healing, Prophetic Evangelism, Ministry Administration, or Lay Counseling
2. Develop your Ministry Plan
3. Develop your Business Plan

The final project work is a significant portion of the program. There is no time for good ideas; only God ideas; these are the projects that He supports and where we experience His presence. We each need to hear from the Lord. This could be as simple as a home church, discipleship meetings, small business, or a significant **ministry or business** plan for global Kingdom advancement. It is not the size that matters. This is individual and relational. We celebrate with joy what the Lord wants to do through you.

Goal	To help the student better understand the prophets in the Bible through the Spirit of God, in their timeline; to see current prophets and gain a heart of discernment and maturity in personally hearing God to bring into existence what God wants to create as a final project . All set in an environment for the student to gain deeper insight for a life of ministry, whether in a secular job or an actual ministry position.

PROPHETS PAST AND PRESENT

1 CR RMIN 306 PROPHETIC OVERVIEW

Course Description

In this module, we explore the Current Events, the Biblical examples of a prophet, and the

prophetic ministry. We then look at the timeline and how the OT prophets interacted with the kings and people of their day. We then look at current prophetic trends, ministries, and the effects on the Body of Christ and humanity as a whole. This course includes a prophetic, revelatory activation.

OT PROPHETIC HISTORY

1 CR RMIN 307 900-800 BC: OT HISTORY PT 1

Course Description

How did Holy Spirit move in the OT? In this brief overview, we will look at the history of Israel. This study looks at leadership in the Old Testament, in a revelatory study as we look at the kings of Israel and Judah during the united and divided kingdom era and their implication and application today. This class lays a foundation for the historical and spiritual study of OT history.

3 CR RMIN 308 800-700 BC: OT HISTORY PT 2

Course Description

These classes look at both major and minor prophets and their historical and chronological order as far as is known today. This is a study of their interaction with the kings, each other, and people of their day and how these prophets made a difference before and during the fall of the Northern Kingdom. We will look at how this applies to us today as we seek to understand what God is saying through these scriptures. We will look briefly at Elijah and Elisha; Joel; we will compare and contrast Jonah and Nahum; we will study Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, and Micah.

3 CR RMIN 309 700-586 BC: OT HISTORY PT 3

Course Description

These classes look at both major and minor prophets during 700-586 BC and their historical and chronological order as far as is known today. This is a study of their interaction with the kings, each other, and people of their day and how these prophets made a difference before and during the fall of the Southern Kingdom. We will look at how this applies to us today as we seek to understand what God is saying through these scriptures. We will study Zephaniah & Habakkuk, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, Obadiah.

2 CR RMIN 310 530-430 BC: POST-EXILIC

Course Description

This class looks at the Post Exilic period of Israel. We again look at the timeline from a historical, governmental, spiritual, prophetic, and revelatory perspective. In these classes, we study

the books of Ezra, Haggai, Zechariah, Esther, and Nehemiah and their application in their time and ours.

OLD TESTAMENT LITERATURE MODULE PART 2: WISDOM/KETUVIM

1 CR RMIN 311 BOOKS OF WISDOM/KETUVIM

Course Description

This is a powerful and revelatory study on human suffering, faith, and the power of God. We take a closer look at the "accuser" and the eternal implications concerning man's relationship with God and man.

PROPHETIC PROJECT

Course Description

Choices on the Final Ministry Project include:

1. Creating a ministry project and writing a final paper detailing the project, then presenting it with a budget and plan.
2. Creating a ministry-based business from fresh revelation and providing a business plan in their presentation.
3. Learn about and serve in existing ministry: Healing, Prophetic Evangelism, Supernatural Administration, or Lay Counseling

10 CR BMIN MINISTRY or BUSINESS PROJECT CLASSES

BMIN 301 BIBLICAL MINDSET AND BIRTHING GOD'S PLAN

Course Description

As you are studying the OT Prophet and hearing God, this class will help students focus on hearing God's plan and bringing that plan into reality, understand the importance to overcome poverty mindsets and culture wars in our local and global community.

BMIN 302 IDEAS, ISSUES AND OVERCOMING

In this class you will learn how to handle issues and deal with problems, how to brainstorm, understand convergence, and the measure of success.

BMIN 303 BASIC DATA, ANALYSIS, AND PLANNING

Data and analysis can be great for some but for others that sounds very dry, this class brings data and analysis to life as it fits your worldview and the plan which gave you your passion, you will also learn about your stakeholders and create a SMART timeline.

BMIN 304 WORKING WITH REAL PEOPLE

We need the body to expand the kingdom of God. In this class, you will gain perspective

concerning your team, conflict resolution, creating a budget, understanding the terminology, and finally based on your smart goals create wins and losses with SWOT analysis.

5 CR BMIN 305 FINAL PROJECT

Course Description

In this class, we will examine the prophetic

footprint of your project, and your assets, and actively work on your plan. Each project includes literature review and etc. A 7,000 to 12,500-word formal paper and presentation will be the culmination of this course

MASTER of CHRISTIAN COUNSELING

The Master of Christian Counseling degree is designed to equip you with the specialized training you will need as you are called to counsel the broken-hearted. Christian counseling combines faith with the principles of Psychology. You will be trained to work with individuals, families, and groups in treating mental health and behavioral problems by means of a Christian perspective. Students learn and grow in their knowledge of human psychology through field-tested techniques and practices for promoting the mental health and wellness in diverse communities.

Upon graduating with the CMM College of Theology Master of Christian Counseling, students can earn a certificate and licensure with NCCA in the Arno Profiling System.

PATHS OF STUDY: If a student graduates with a Master in Counseling with CMM College of Theology and need to switch directions to a Doctor of Ministry in Biblical Studies with us, they would have to take the Master of Theology course.

Goal	To give students a Christian perspective on human development as they deepen their understanding that we are perfectly and wonderfully made. Students will learn how to help the hurting navigate through the challenges of life. Trusting in the sufficiency of Christ is foundational. This is a 36 credit course.
Prerequisites	Bachelor degree with a 2.5 GPA or higher. Students may be eligible for entrance given education experience.
Graduation Requirements	Completion of all course requirements 33 graduate credit hours beyond the bachelor's degree, with a 3.00 GPA of a 4.00, (accomplished by passing this course and writing an original thesis paper)

8 CR MCC 300 PERSONAL ASSESSMENTS SUPERNATURAL IDENTITY

Course Description

Our body and soul needs are important part of our spiritual growth. Students will track growth throughout the year through assessment style study devotionals, and workbooks.

3 CR MCC 301 INTRODUCTION TO NOUTHETIC CHRISTIAN COUNSELING

Course Description

This course introduces Christ-centered counseling foundations. The Bible-based form of counseling holds the premise that the Bible is God's word (2 Timothy 3:16-17) and is totally sufficient for meeting the mental, spiritual and emotional needs of mankind. (2 Peter 1:3-4)

3 CR MCC 302 ADVANCED FUNDAMENTALS OF COUNSELING

Course Description

This course will prepare the student to understand the deeper levels of the foundations of Christian counseling as students investigate biblical principles and see differences between

Biblical counseling and Christian counseling. They will gain a greater insight of humanism and understand the most current tools in both ministry and secular counseling.

3 CR MCC 303 HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND GROWTH

Course Description

This course brings a greater awareness of being fearfully and wonderfully made. Students will attain deeper levels of being fully secure for goals and purposes of becoming more like Christ as we relate to God and others.

2 CR MCC 304 POST TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER

Course Description

Students gain understanding of the reality of PTSD. There is hope for this malady. Christian counseling has been the most effective in healing these wounded precious people.

4 CR MCC 305 ETHICS OF CHRISTIAN COUNSELING INTRODUCTION TO DSM

Course Description

This course will explain the necessity of ethics in Christian counseling. Character is critical. Integrity is a must. There are many forms to read and comprehend to protect both the counselee and the counselor.

4 CR MCC 306 CHRISTIAN COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL THERAPY

Course Description

Cognitive therapy has proven to be the most effective counseling tool. Students will learn how to rewire the brain and adjust the counselee's thinking to remediate depression, anxiety, etc. The workbook for the course is meant to cause reflective and critical thinking, which will facilitate one's counseling ability.

3 CR MCC 307 NEUROTHEOLOGY 101

Course Description

Students will be introduced to studying the correlation between the Word of God and the brain. Neurotheology is the proven connection between neuroscience and spiritual practices. Research shows faith will improve counselees' lives and relationships. Students' increased comprehension of God's marvelous and mysterious ways will facilitate their counseling ability.

3 CR MCC 308 TEMPERAMENT ANALYSIS (ARNO; MBTI; DISC; ETC)

Course Description

This course will help students define temperament, personality, environmental effects on behaviors, genetic influence, and taking responsibility for one's actions.

3 CR MCC 309 FINAL WRITING PROJECT CASE STUDY

Course Description

This is a case study and practicum based. Students will counsel for at least six sessions and base their final project on this powerful experience.

****NCCA Certification & License Program**

MCC 310 BASIC CHRISTIAN COUNSELING

Course Description

This is an independent and self-paced course. This course aims to provide the student with a basic understanding of nine of the counseling protocols for remediation.

MCC 311 ARNO TEMPERAMENT THEORY

Course Description

This is an independent and self-paced course. This course aims to give the student a working knowledge of temperament and how it affects every aspect of life. The course is provided to give insight and knowledge into the inner workings of man. Students will learn that temperament is a causal factor in nearly all men's interpersonal and intrapersonal conflicts.

MCC 312 ARNO TEMPERAMENT THERAPY

Course Description

This is an independent and self-paced course. The purpose of this course is to provide the student with apply the protocol of the theory of temperament. To understand the "inner man" of the counselee, to determine the counselee's temperament needs. Students understand how temperament needs must be met in a balanced, Godly way.

MCC 313 RESEARCH AND DESIGN IN THE COUNSELING FIELD

Course Description

Students gain insight into the importance of reliability and validity in the protocol. Field testing is discussed and examined.

MCC 314 WRITING CASE STUDIES

Course Description

This is an independent and self-paced course. The purpose of this course is to help the student come to a better understanding of how to counsel using the temperament model developed by Drs Richard and Phyllis Arno. Reading the case studies, the student is given an in-depth insight into effectively using this model as a tool in counseling.

MASTER of THEOLOGY in BIBLICAL STUDIES

The second year of the master degree offers a higher level of analysis and synthesis of the Bible, theology and church history. The perspective is both personal and global, helping the student to find a more intimate walk with the Lord and their place in the global community, through teaching, preaching and etc.

Goal	To understand Biblical principles and its history in a life-giving way that can be applied to the future, helping students clarify God's plan and their place in the coming harvest through revelatory theology in the Word of God and by His Spirit. Students then prepare and teach throughout the world as an advanced practicum
Prerequisites	Master of Ministry in Biblical Studies with a 2.5 GPA or higher. Students may be eligible for entrance given education experience.
Graduation Requirements	60 graduate credit hours beyond the bachelor degree, with a 2.50 GPA of a 4.00, (accomplished by passing these 30 graduate credit courses, and writing an original thesis paper)

1 CR RCOR 501 SPIRITUAL FORMATION

Course Description

Our body and soul needs are an important part of our spiritual growth. An examination and trackable measures to help build intimacy with the Lord through the power of Holy Spirit.

RCOR 502 FEASTS-CURRENT EVENTS & BIBLICAL IMPLICATIONS

Course Description

Brief overview of God's feasts and timetable, is a powerful experiential class, students will quantify what they gained through it.

1 CR RCOR 503 RESEARCH-STUDY METHODS WRITING/PRESENTING

Course Description

This course helps the student in the academic rigors of research and writing both analysis and synthesis. Communicating what you hear from God and in His timing is important. There are many means of doing this and this course will explore a few and offer resources to help grow your skills.

INSPIRED LEADERSHIP

2 CR MTH 504 PROPHETIC LEADERSHIP

Course Description

This study looks at **prophetic leadership**, in a revelatory study as we look Samuel, Saul and David and the implications for their timeline as well as ours today. A survey of the books of Samuel looks at the life and times of Samuel, Saul, and David, their choices, decisions, and relationships.

2 CR MTH-505 OT and NT CONNECTION

Course Description

This is a revelatory study of faith, review of foundations of the faith and guidance for the modern Christian leader through the book of Hebrews.

CHURCH HISTORY MODULE

Course Description

This module is a basic survey of Christian church history with an emphasis on the movements of Holy Spirit and generals of the faith. We compare and contrast this with world religions. We look at God's appointments with leaders during the events between the testaments, considering when society and social norms changed, as well as AD 70 with the persecution of the day and current implications.

1 CR MTH 506 BETWEEN THE TESTAMENTS

Course Description

A brief study of the time between the testaments, the implications, and applications today.

1 CR MTH 507 AD 70

Course Description

A brief study of the fall of Jerusalem and the implications and applications today

3 CR MTH 508 SURVEY of CHURCH HISTORY

Course Description

A basic look at Church History and worldview.

1 CR MTH 509 GOD'S GENERALS

Course Description

Study the lives of those who went before us to get a rich understanding of the Christian faith as well as the call on your own life.

REVELATORY THEOLOGY

1 CR MTH 510 Intro to Defending THE FAITH

Course Description

Basic introduction and look at defending the faith. This course makes cultural apologetics more accessible and enjoyable to study.

1 CR MTH 511 INTRO to PRACTICAL BIBLICAL INTERPRETATION

Course Description

Study of pastoral and heart hermeneutics through application in real-life situations.

1 CR MTH 512 SURVEY of WORLD RELIGIONS and APPLIED MISSIONS

Course Description

A brief study of world religions from a Christian perspective.

2 CR MTH 513 THEOLOGY RESEARCH PT 1 and 2

Course description

This course makes theology not only enlightening but a treasure hunt. Students are always surprised to see what they have learned in the past doesn't always line up with what the Word says, and even more surprised how it applies to their life, work, and ministry as they learn to research in a fresh way.

10 CR MTH 514 THEOLOGY THESIS

An 8,000-12,500-word formal thesis and presentation will be the culmination of this course. This study opens up new revelatory vistas for students as they research and develop basic theological with the Bible and scholars. Students learn how to put a literature review together to form a final paper as well.

THEOLOGY AND OUTREACH

1 CR MTH 515 EVANGELISM, DISCIPLESHIP AND YOU

Course Description

How do you share the Gospel and disciple? How does this affect you personally and what is God calling you to do?

2 CR MTH 516 GLOBAL PRACTICUM

Course description

This course gives students an opportunity to teach to an international audience. Students will be expected to develop goals, outcomes and outline for the class they teach. Class will be assigned by the instructor in cooperation with CMM Missions Director.

MASTER OF DIVINITY

This course builds on the Master of Ministry and Master in Theology, it is a progressive degree and students need those courses or the equivalent to begin the Master of Divinity. The Master of Divinity focus is both personal and global, helping the student to function in ministry and in community.

Goal	Develop critical thinking skills; greater sensitivity to Holy Spirit; greater love for the Lord and his people and a fresh perspective, provide the basics for the biblical Hebrew and Greek languages, using critical exegetical tools for deeper study and revelation, provide an understanding for basic pastoral care and counseling to develop necessary skills for ministry within a variety of settings, and cross-cultural contexts.
Prerequisites	Master of Theology with a 2.5 GPA or higher. Students may be eligible for entrance given education and life experience. Students can apply MMin and MTh hours and coursework. If students do not have a complete portfolio, we can offer gap learning for credits which only applies to certain situations. An interview is necessary for entrance into this degree.
Graduation Requirements	90 graduate credit hours beyond the bachelor degree, with a 2.50 GPA of a 4.00, (accomplished by passing this 30 graduate credit course)

6CR MDV 617 HEBREW AND TOOLS

Course description

This course is a must and basic understanding of the biblical Hebrew

6CR MDV 618 GREEK AND TOOLS

This course is a must and basic understanding of the biblical Greek.

3CR MPAS 619 PASTORAL CARE & LEADERSHIP

Course description

This is a study of basic pastoral care and understanding. This is a must for all ministry students.

3CR MCOU 620 COUNSELING AND REVELATION

Course description

This is a study of basic Counseling. This is not a full counseling degree or does this make you a certified counselor. Every ministry student needs

to understand the basics of counseling and its application in their culture along with where to get help when needed

12CR MCHA 621 PASTORING IN CRISIS

There are many chaplaincy programs that are a tremendous blessing around the world. To be a chaplain you need to study with the chaplaincy program that you want to serve. You are only recognized when you travel with the program and team that you studied with and were deployed by. That being said we want to offer a powerful set of tools that will aid you in ministry. CRI International approaches this topic from a pastoral care perspective. This course does not make you a chaplain. You can go on to be a part of CRI International if you desire. We believe they lay a great foundation.

DOCTORAL COURSES

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY

Prerequisites	Master of Theology degree or the equivalent, with a 3.00 GPA or higher out of a 4.00. Students may be eligible for entrance given education experience.
Graduation requirements	Students must earn at least 40 graduate credit hours with a 3.00 GPA beyond the Master of Theology or the equivalent, accomplished by: attending classes; passing assignments, and writing the dissertation. Successful completion of scholarly dissertation of 100-200 pages that reflects original research, design and revelation and an assessment of character and spiritual development in line with rigors of the course

DOCTOR of THEOLOGY or CPhD

Goal	For the doctoral candidate to present themselves before the Lord to better understand their contribution to humanity and then to be able to express some part of the whole through a dissertation leading to a book.
Prerequisites	Doctorate of Ministry degree with a 3.00 GPA or higher out of a 4.00. Significant experience in ministry or teaching. Evidence of scholarly research ability and theological reflection. Students may be eligible for entrance given education experience.
Graduation requirements	Students must earn at least 40 graduate credit hours with a 3.00 GPA beyond the Doctor of Ministry or the equivalent, a total of 60 graduate credit hours beyond the master degree, accomplished by: attending classes; passing assignments, and writing the dissertation with a 3.00 GPA; successful completion of a scholarly dissertation of 55,000-75,000 words that reflects original research; and an assessment of character and spiritual development that meets set requirements/standards.

Course description

**Electives are assigned on an individual basis. This course is not for everyone. Few will achieve on this level.

Doctor of Theology or the CPhD. is a research ministry degree. This degree is to be considered a **contribution to humanity**. This course is self-paced research program that compels the student to study and find their voice. Our courses are times of refreshing and encouragement to help build and foster community. This project will be the student's contribution to humanity. The project will culminate with a *55-75,000-word (around 200 to 250 pages)*, dissertation to be presented before the class and defended before the review board.

You are about to embark on a powerful journey that we believe will bless and change your life forever. The doctorate was created for personal research, study, and discovery.
